**Jean Treuthart** grew up in a household filled with books. Her earliest favorite book was *Charlotte's Web* followed by the Nancy Drew series. Jean's love of literature developed into a love of writing. She has been a hobbyist for many years producing media criticism, a series of essays on middle age and a play that had a local reading in the 1990's.

Jean graduated from the University of Maryland with a bachelor's degree in management studies and went on to earn a master's degree in cultural communications from the College of Notre Dame of Maryland. She has taken writing courses at York College of Pennsylvania and U.C.L.A.

From 2003 to 2014, Jean championed access and opportunity to education at Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC) in the position of Campus Vice President of the York Campus. In 2015 Jean joined YWCA York as CEO. Jean is active on community boards, including Better York, York Counts and WellSpan York Hospital and previously served on the boards of Rotary Club of York and the YCEA. She is also an advisory committee member for the Graham Center for Entrepreneurial Leadership Studies at Penn State York and on the council for the Women's Business Center Organization of the YCEA.

In June of 2017, Jean was honored by the Central Penn Business Journal with a lifetime achievement award as part of their Women of Influence Awards luncheon. Jean has a daughter, Lauren Wilson, who is an attorney living in Los Feliz, California.

**Steve Baker** learned to read on a large-format hardbound and illustrated copy of *Doctor Doolittle* that he and his mother would read aloud together before bed. But by the 5<sup>th</sup> grade Steve found reading to be a challenge due to what he would later find to be dyslexia. Despite that restriction, he loved doing research—pre-internet—and proved to be a decent writer as well.

Steve graduated from the Pennsylvania State University in 1983 with a Bachelor's degree in Marketing, and later, in 2002, earned a Master's degree in Publication Design from the University of Baltimore. His career focused primarily on education, teaching one- and two-day computer seminars for private industry, as well as continuing education and for-credit classes at Bradley Academy for the Visual Arts, Penn State York, Johns Hopkins and York College of Pennsylvania, most recently teaching classes in computer graphics, graphic design and web design.

In addition to occasional freelance work, Steve currently serves on the board of Creative York, formerly YorkArts, and is working with the York Quaker Meeting to expand their current facility, the historic 1766 Friends' Meetinghouse on West Philadelphia Street.

Steve's family has been connected to Martin Library for four generations. Most recently, his mother, Martha Baker Frankenberry, served on the library's Honor's Committee and Board of Directors.
